The current status is that the photo I submitted was not challenged despite Doges On Trial having a very active community challenging photos with a near perfect track record (until this one).

Now, according to the policy:

*"To be considered valid, a picture must clearly display a doge or a cat. Pictures with hidden doges or cats will not be considered as valid if a normal observer would not be able to see it without help (e.g., an image with a doge only a few px large would not be considered valid, because an observer would be unable to see it with plain sight)."*

- There is nothing hidden in the picture. It clearly shows an animal.
- The animal is either a doge or a cat.
- The Doges On Trial community considered it a doge, when it's in fact, a cat.
